WHEREAS: It is important that the voters of the City of Pasadena set City policy favoring completion of the 710 Freeway between the I-210 Freeway and the I-10 Freeway. Such a policy is important to the future of the City. With such a policy the City can commit energies and resources to the completion of the 710 Freeway. Such a policy will also communicate to elected officials and staff at the County, State and Federal levels the will of the people of Pasadena to complete the 710 Freeway.

The People of the City of Pasadena ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. The policy of the City of Pasadena favors completion of the 710 Freeway between the I-210 Freeway and the I-10 Freeway.

SECTION 2. This ordinance shall not be repealed or amended except by a vote of the people.

SECTION 3. If passed, this ordinance shall be considered as adopted upon the date that the vote is declared by the legislative body, and shall go into effect 10 days after that date.



(b) The result of votes cast for Measure A (An Initiative Ordinance of the City of Pasadena Favoring Completion of the 710 Freeway), Measure B (Charter Amendment Prohibiting Local Public Officials from Receiving a Public or Campaign Advantage from Recipients of Certain Public Benefits), and Measure C (A Proposed Ordinance of the City of Pasadena in Favor of a Citywide Transportation and Traffic Management Plan and Related to the City's Position Regarding the 710 Freeway), are as follows:

BACKGROUND:

The City of Pasadena held its District Primary Nominating Election on Tuesday, March 6, 2001, for City Council Districts 3, 5, and 7. Pasadena City Charter Section 1204 provides that "Any person who, at the primary election, shall receive a majority of the total vote cast for candidates for said office shall be elected to such office."

At the March 6th election, District 3 candidate Chris Holden and District 7 candidate Sidney F. Tyler, Jr. each received the majority of votes from their districts and were re-elected to the office of Councilmember, Districts 3 and 7, respectively. District 5 candidate Victor Gordo also received the majority of district votes and was elected to the office of Councilmember, District 5.

Special municipal elections were called and consolidated with the district primary nominating election to submit to the voters of the City of Pasadena Measures A, B, and C referenced above.

Pursuant to Article VII of the Pasadena City Charter, also consolidated with the City district primary municipal election was the primary nominating election for members of the Board of Education. Board of Education Seats 1, 3, and 5 were open for election, as well as two new Seats 6 and 7 which were approved by voters on November 7, 2000, as a result of a Charter Reform study on School District governance. The official canvass results for the Pasadena Unified School District election are submitted directly to the Board of Education.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The total cost of this election to the City will be shared pro rata by the Pasadena Unified School District, based on a formula to be established by the Registrar of Voters Office. The cost of this election will be tabulated upon receipt of all invoices, and the School District will be invoiced by the City for its pro rata share of costs.

A total of \$491,448 was initially budgeted in the City Clerk's Department, Election Division, FY 2001 budget for the estimated cost of the consolidated primary and general elections. An additional \$34,000 was added to this base budget for County Registrar signature verification costs for two initiative petitions (for Measures A and B) and costs associated with adding all three measures to the ballot.

There will be no City of Pasadena general municipal election, as the above-referenced candidates for the three Council district races were elected in the primary election by majority vote. There will be a Pasadena Unified School District general election on April 17, 2001, for Board of Education Seats 6 and 7, as no candidates for these two seats received a majority of votes in the primary nominating election. The Pasadena Unified School District will be invoiced the full cost for the upcoming April 17th PUSD general election.
